Outstanding Programmatic Accomplishments: Due to limited space, only three major program areas will be highlighted. Brazeal is the only FCS agent in Collins county and it has a population of more than 750,000. She is responsible for all FCS program areas.

Parenting Education: Parenting Education was identified as a critical issue in the early 1990s and continues today. Partnerships with churches, school districts, city Parks and Rec departments, Collin College, parent groups including Practical Parent Education in Plano and other groups have been established with outstanding results. Parenting education classes are regularly taught in various locations throughout Collin County. A quarterly newsletter, Be the Best You Can Be... Parenting Young Children, which began in 1994, is currently distributed to 21 groups and agencies who distribute to more than 2500 families. In 1997, Brazeal began teaching parenting education to male inmates at the county Detention Center on a weekly basis. In 2001, an additional weekly class for minimum security male and female inmates (SCORE) was added. An eight-week series has been evaluated for three years using pre- and post-tests for each lesson. Results show significant increases in knowledge. Detention as well as SCORE officials report that Brazeal's classes are consistently ranked outstanding by participants and her classes always have a waiting list.

Child Care Provider Trainings: In order to meet the need for reliable, economical training for child care providers, Brazeal partnered with Collin County Community College to sponsor a day-long conference that was held in 1990 and 1991. Both conferences were well-received with more than 200 providers attending each. When the college had a change of leadership, Brazeal formed a coalition to plan, conduct and evaluate additional conferences. Beginning in 1993, 3, three hour conferences for providers have been offered annually. The format has stayed the same: two or three topics are suggested by the planning committee and Brazeal conducts the sessions. Average attendance has grown from 50 per conference to 175. In 2008, 596 participated in the three conferences, which expanded in 2007 to include two additional conferences for home-based providers. Providers can easily obtain their required clock hours of training by participating in these conferences along with trainings offered through Plano and Frisco Parks and Rec Departments, which began in 1996. Participants were evaluated after participating in two conferences in 2007 with the following results:

- *268 of 269 (99.7%) indicated that the training would help them become a more effective early childhood educator.
- *268 of 288 (99.35%) indicated that the information received at the training would help them improve the quality of care that they provide for the children they care for.
- *284 of 286 (99.35%) indicated that the topics covered in the conference were relevant to the work they do as an early childhood educator
- *286 of 289 (99.02%) indicated that the training provided them with new ideas that they can use in their child care program

<u>Diabetes Education:</u> Brazeal established a Diabetes Coalition in 2002 which includes representatives from five local hospitals, community volunteers and people with type 2 diabetes. This group sponsors Do Well Be Well with Diabetes and Cooking Well with Diabetes twice annually. Coalition members regularly serve as presenters and actively market classes to their patients. Brazeal teaches at least one session per series. The pre-, post- and follow-up surveys indicate that knowledge was learned and several best practices adopted including carb counting, plate method, recipe modification, regular visits with medical team and written logs for blood sugar testing. She writes the quarterly Living Well with Diabetes, a newsletter targeted to those with type 2. She is a regular speaker for several diabetes support groups and serves on the Diabetes Advisory Board for one of the hospitals.

Brazeal continually demonstrates strong work with her Family Advisory Board and Diabetes Coalition. She has established outstanding community collaborations with many groups and agencies and continues to build new partnerships. She has impressive documented outcomes in parenting education, diabetes education, Walk Across Texas and child care provider conferences. She is recognized by not only her peers but other professionals for strong programs.
