Outstanding Programmatic Accomplishments: In addition to Liz's distinguished past recent accomplishments include the following. Inmate Re-entry Life Skills Program: The topics for the inmate program focus on the three major program areas: financial literacy, family life skills and nutrition. The sessions are presented through distance education and were conducted by Liz and colleagues with other presenters that are experts in their field. Topics covered by other speakers include: motivational messages, mental health issues, transitional housing, health services, drug & alcohol rehabilitation, family violence, breast health, legal assistance, individual & family counseling and job skills training. Since 2004 Liz has supervised and conducted 308 sessions with 1479 participants, with 28 collaborators and volunteer speakers, a few of which include the Mayor's office re-entry program; Susan Komen Breast Cancer Foundation Education Committee; South Texas College of Law; Planned Parenthood of Houston and Southeast Texas, Inc.; and Attorney General of Texas Child Support Division. Financial Literacy: The topics for the financial literacy are the Building Fiscally Fit Families money management six lesson series that includes: Budgeting 101: Strengthening Your Dollars and Cents. Setting Your Household in Order, Power of Credit, Identity Theft: When Bad Things Happen to Your Good Name, Feeding Your Family Without Starving Your Wallet and Thrive By Five, with groups meeting longer than six weeks, Liz offers additional topics such as Invest in Your Debt, Feeding Your Family When Disaster Strikes, Financial Emergency Preparedness, The Grand Plan for Cleaning and Are You a Financial Enabler? Classes taught at schools are directed to the parents at the parent centers in English. Liz also presets in Spanish when needed. The "Building Fiscally Fit Families" six lesson money management series has been conducted 1083 sessions and reached 71,816 since 2002 at 48 sites, a few of which include area Elementary school parent centers; Houston Recovery Campus-clients; All About Recovery - clients; Volunteers of America (Lavender and Roger sites) - clients; Greenwood Forest Resident Club-Garden Club; New Hope Housing; La Rosa Family Service Center; Golden Vista Texas Extension Education Association Club; Champion's Women's Antique Club; City of Houston Health and Human Services Re-entry Program; Lakewood Neighborhood Library; Barkers Landing Community Club; Texas Nursery Landscaper's Association; Salvation Army; Houston Department of Health and Human Services-Harris County Area of Aging; Texas Teen Challenge; 2nd Annual Grandparent Caregiver Expo; The Gathering Place; and Leo Daniels Senior Center. Over 30 partners/collaborators are involved in programming efforts including Domestic Relations Office: Edward Jones; Christian Women's Job Corps; Texas Department of Criminal Justice; Financial Literacy Advisory Committee; Cooperative Extension Program-Prairie View A&M University; Youth and Family Services Department; Houston Recovery Campus; Neemesys McGee Education Coordinator-Precinct 3 Commissioner; and Texas Extension Education Association officers, delegates and members. Fit and *Healthy Camp*: a program that began in 2011 and focuses on preventing childhood overweight. It adapted from the "Balancing Food and Play," curriculum but targets parents. The Fit and Healthy Camp, is a four lesson series, focusing on parents, that encourages healthy, nutritional choices & positive lifestyle changes. Objectives include promoting increased fruit and vegetable consumption; encouraging water as a beverage; reinforcing the importance of at least 60 minutes of daily physical activity; and encouraging the limitation of screen time to less than 2 hours per day. Sessions include "Journey to Better Health"; "What is My Pyramid?"; "Nutty About Nutrients"; and "Setting Goals". In 2011, 11 sessions were presented 124 participants took part with a total 310 contacts in this program area at 4 different area Elementary School Parent Centers. Better Living for Texans Program During 2010, more than 5,225 Harris County adults participated in the BLT Eat Better to Live Better series focusing on meal planning, stretching food dollars, and adopting selected behaviors that can reduce the risk of food-borne illness.
