

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Q & **A** re: JCEP JOINT COUNCIL OF EXTENSION PROFESSIONALS BY: DOUG WARNOCK, 1995 CHAIR

Exactly what is JCEP..pronounced "Jay-Sep"?

The "alpha soup" denotes Joint Council of Extension Professionals. It's a coalition of four national Extension personnel organizations. Those member organizations are: (1) National Association of Extension 4-H Agents, (2) National Association of Extension Home Economists, (3) National Association of County Agricultural Agents and (4) Epsilon Sigma Phi.

What's the JCEP Mission?

The JCEP mission is to promote communication, cooperation and professionalism among all Extension educators. Purposes are:

- To encourage communication and a closer working relationship among the four professional organizations, ECOP and the nationwide Cooperation Extension System.
- To serve as a liaison between and a communication link to the individual organizations of the coalition.
- To strengthen and support Extension as a profession.
- To coordinate and facilitate leadership training opportunities.

Who is seated on the Council?

The presidential title holders (past, present, and elect), of all four member organizations, are seated on the council. ESP is represented by Bill Braden, Margaret Viebrock, and Richard Angus. In 1996 Patrick Boyle will replace Angus. The officers rotate among those member organizations.

What's JCEP accomplished since its formation 6 years ago?

Each spring JCEP sponsors the Public Issues/Leadership Seminar in Washington DC giving members first hand experience in getting around the Capital scene. There's 4 regional leadership workshops in February for the state and national leaders of all member organizations.

There's participation by JCEP officers in the national meetings of each organization. The 1997 Galaxy Summit, when all the organizations, will gather in Cincinnati, is a JCEP product.

ECOP has included JCEP as a partner in its plan to implement the national Strategic Framework for Extension.


So you're an Extension professional who's interested in a career move— perhaps a move to another state or an assignment abroad. Just where do you start that allusive job search?

The CHRONICLE OF HIGHER EDUCATION is a good starter source. It is available in university libraries and provides job listing associated with major universities throughout the country.

Via the Internet, you have a number of possibilities at your fingertips. One is the job bank bulletin from CSCEES at USDA. This is a service of the Communication, Information and Technology staff and focuses mainly on positions related to communications and technology. To subscribe, send an e-mail message to <almanac@esuda.gov>. Use this command: <subscribe cit-jobs-mg>.

The Online Career Center is available through gopher on the Internet. It provides career assistance and job searching by region or state. Once on gopher, follow these instructions:<access host=garnet.msen.com>.

Another possibility is the nationwide Extension job vacancy service operated by Oregon State University. This service is available through almanac. To access, send an e-mail to <almanac@oes.orst.edu>. Use this command: <send extension vacancies>.



You can also access this listing of job vacancies via the Oregon Cooperative extension gopher server: <gopher://sulaco.oes.orst.edu:70/11/est.jobs>.

In addition, here are two options via the World Wide Web using the following URLs (Uniform Resource Locators): http://ghost.esusda.gov/partners/ces.loc.htm> and http://ghost.esusda.gov/partners/ces.loc.htm> and http://www.ces.ncsu.edu/national/extwebs.htm>.

While the above listed options offer some possibilities, many times personal contact is the best approach. If you are interested in Extension positions in a particular state, simply contact the Extension personnel or human resources department in that state. Presidents of state Extension professional associations and organizations can provide assistance in contacting appropriate offices and/or individuals.

Many professional organizations also offer listings of position vacancies. For instance, Agricultural Communications in Education (ACE) offers such a service for positions in communications and technology related areas.
