CALL FOR PRESENTATION PROPOSALS

The Galaxy Summit Committee invites you to submit a proposal for presenting a seminar, research report or poster presentation in Cincinnati, Ohio.

The educational focus of the Galaxy Summit builds on the concepts of teamwork, new working relationships and interdisciplinary programs that address current and emerging issues. The goal is to feature educational sessions "all day, every day" of the Summit.

Types of Presentations

<u>Seminars (50 minutes)</u>

An informal session which may be a presentation, panel discussion, round table discussion, hands-on demonstration or any other method. Topics may include (but are not limited to): successful programs, innovative management techniques, unique delivery methods relevant to Extension educators.

Research Reports (25 minutes)

Summary of research findings that would be relevant to Extension educators. Two reports will be grouped into a 50 minute time slot.

Poster Session

Visual displays (charts, graphs, photos) that encourage informal discussion. Topics may include (but are not limited to): successful programs, innovative management techniques, unique delivery methods relevant to Extension educators. A display panel will be provided for each poster. The presenter is responsible for setting up, taking down and staffing the display during designated times.

Presenter Expenses/Responsibilities

All presenters are responsible for: a) their own expenses including registration, travel, lodging, equipment rental and handouts; b) presenting their session or finding a suitable substitute; c) being available for consultation with Summit participants immediately following their presentation.

Submitting a Presentation Proposal

The Presentation Proposal will consist of the following items:

*Presentation Proposal Cover Form (Below)

*Computer Disk

Include a 3 1/2" DOS formatted, IBM compatible computer disk with the following files:
a) Abstract I.
b) Abstract II
On the disk label note the word processing software (including version) used.

* Abstract I - One Paper Copy, Disk File

- a) Title of presentation on the first line
- b) On the line directly under the title, type the name, title, address and telephone number of the main presenter.
- c) If there are co-presenters, on the next line type "Co-presenters" and their names and titles.
- d) For Seminars and Posters: Begin on the next line, indent three spaces and type the abstract in one, single spaced paragraph of no more than 400 words. Include a brief description of the format and instructional technique that will be used (i.e. lecture, video, participatory activities, etc.)
- For Research Reports: Begin on the next line, indent three spaces and type the abstract using the following headings: 1) research questions and/or hypothesis; 2) methodology including the number of subjects and statistical procedures; 3) findings; 4) conclusions; 5) implications for practice or further research. Limit research abstracts to no more than 400 words.

*<u>Abstract II</u> - Seven Paper Copies, Disk File The same as Abstract I, deleting items b & c. This abstract will be used for "blind" evaluation of the abstract by a review committee.

A clear, concise abstract that can be published in the conference proceedings handbook is required for all presentations. The selection committee's decision will be primarily based on the abstract.

Include three typed, self adhesive mailing labels with the main presenter's name and address.
