So how do we get the word to our colleagues that Epsilon Sigma Phi is more than another set of dues to pay or another line on the vitae? I cannot find any cute acronyms to get the message across but here are a few tips that might work.

- REACH OUT - Target your audience. Blanket invitations to join ESP are not as effective as a personal invitation from a colleague and friend.
- PERSONALIZE YOUR MESSAGE - Examples of the benefits you have gained are a real selling point in getting new members.
- SHARE THE WEALTH - Sharing the messages and materials from national meetings is a great way to introduce people to ESP.
- PERCEPTION - Let people know that ESP's mission is different from those associations whose focus is on subject matter. ESP's commitment to leadership and professional development are the foundation upon which a career is built.
- POSITIVE ATTITUDE - Be upbeat and positive when you talk about Epsilon Sigma Phi. Never miss a chance to point out the advantages of being a member of ESP.
- INVOLVEMENT - If someone is already a member then involvement in the chapter and eventually at a higher level is the best way of retaining them as members.

Membership and involvement in Epsilon Sigma Phi gives us a voice and a unity in Extension regardless of programming focus and career stages. We choir members need to get our message out. We need to sing loudly, clearly and joyfully!

“Walk the Talk” Pilot Survey in Missouri

As you know, we are conducting a baseline survey of what Extension offices are doing to practice sustainable living behaviors. This will help answer the question “How can we encourage more people to get involved in more ways?” We have piloted the survey with Extension specialists in Missouri. So far, I have received 32 responses. Some of the findings are:

Seventy-five percent of respondents of MU Extension’s “Walk the Talk” survey responded that their office reduced, reused and recycled their waste by:

- Printing on both sides of the paper
- Using reusable dishes
- Recycling glass
- Recycling office paper
- Recycling cardboard

In addition, over 50% of total respondents said that their office also recycled aluminum and used less paper by printing less. To conserve energy, 88% of the offices responding turn their computers off over the weekend. Sixty-one percent of total respondents turn their printers off overnight. Less than 50% adjust their thermostat when no one is in the office. Also on the low side, 30% turn their computers on standby when away from the desk. Over 75% of respondents practice sustainable eating behaviors by eating leftovers from home for lunch. Sixty-one percent prefer foods that are in season for their office meals. Fifty-eight percent of respondents carpool to their programs. Even better than this are the 70% and 72% who carpool to Extension staff meetings and conferences, respectively. Only 30% walk to lunch and 18% walk to work. However, 70% do combine errands to reduce car trips. Some of the additional behaviors from offices were using Energy star-rated equipment, buying organic foods, questioning everything they buy, living close, driving hybrids or other fuel-efficient cars, etc. (*Barbara can be reached by email at BuffaloeB@missouri.edu.)*

Can You Beat This for Dedication?

What Extension educator has the longest working tenure? If you answered Stella McKinstry, you would be correct! Stella is a lifetime member of both ESP and NEAFCS (National Extension Association of Family and Consumer Sciences).

With a career in Extension that spans over sixty years, Stella was recognized at Galaxy in Salt Lake City as the longest working Extension educator in the entire United States. Even with that notoriety, she continued to work until April, 2006 when she decided it was time for her to hit the road in her RV and do more traveling.

Stella was born to Linda and Harold McKinstry in a homestead that is now part of Grand Teton National Park. She still resides in Pinedale, which is the county seat of Sublette County, where Stella was the Home Demonstration Agent, the Home Economist, the Family and Consumer Sciences Extension Educator and, at her retirement, was the area’s Nutrition and Food Safety Extension Educator.

Jan Scholl (PA) wrote the following funny story Stella told on herself. It seems Stella once took rising bread on a city bus to a food demonstration site in Denver. Asked by a man, what was under the cloth, she replied “dough” (the man thought she had money!).

Colorado nearly landed this lifelong learner and educator by offering her a starting salary of \$1,800, but Wyoming upped the ante to \$2,100 and the \$300 difference won Stella over to our side.

Stella was an agent-at-large in Albany, Niobrara, Fremont, Lincoln, Natrona, and Goshen counties during 1946, her first year on the job, and then she worked in Platte County until 1952 before moving back to her home county of Sublette.

In many ways, Stella’s life was different from most women at the time because she was single, had a car, and was independent. Stella said her first car was a four-door Ford that cost her \$600! This independence has enabled her to travel extensively to Australia, New Zealand, Jerusalem, Virgin Islands, Belgium, Holland, France, Germany, Switzerland, Canada, Alaska, South America, Italy, Spain, Portugal, the Mediterranean and many places in between. Since retirement she has enjoyed a cruise through the Panama Canal (plus other sites too numerous to list). If you call Stella and, over a period of a few days you are unable to reach her on the phone, she is probably on another one of her trips!

In 1956 Stella was initiated into ESP membership. In 1957 she was elected to the position of second vice president of what is now NEAFCS, and this year she worked on their 75th Anniversary committee.

Several years ago one of her co-workers laughed when he said that Stella was one of the first people to learn how to use a pressure canner and how to properly make mattresses, but on the trip to that particular meeting she had been in the bookstore buying a book on using the latest word processing system available.

That’s Stella! As her good friend, Mary Martin in Teton County, says “She’s a person you are glad to know. For a long time, she’s been the matriarch of our Extension ‘family.’ People who know her are better for having her in their lives.” (*Phyllis Lewis can be reached by email at pblewis@uwyo.edu.)*

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Public Issues in the Southern States

Every Extension employee is aware of the importance of having a well developed working relationship with key decision makers. Southern states use a variety of techniques to communicate and build rapport with elected officials. Arkansas hosts a late afternoon legislative reception every other year for state representatives and senators while in session. The event is planned and conducted by the five professional associations. Administrators attend the event which features displays of programming. They found a 5 PM to 8 PM reception to be better attended than previously held legislative breakfasts.

Kentucky has developed several activities to maintain rapport with elected officials. The County Judge-Executives' Breakfast, hosted by JCEP, is held annually in conjunction with the judge's association meeting. The Country Kitchen is conducted annually during the legislators' training session. Kentucky-produced food products are used to convey the continued importance of supporting sustainable agriculture. During the legislative session, over 500 youth and adults from across the state meet at the state capital to visit with individual legislators and the governor. Many counties have developed appreciation events for conveying their

educational programming to city, county and state elected officials. Leaders are trained on how to work effectively with elected officials.

Texas maintains a visibility with local, county and state officials at the twice a year county commissioners and county judges meetings of the Texas Association of Counties, sessions designed to update officials on critical issues. Four Extension associations cover expenses for one of the meeting's breaks. During the break agents from various program areas interact with the elected officials and exhibits provide information on Extension programming.

In Louisiana Extension professional associations have developed specific approaches to communicating with elected officials. LAE4-HA takes the lead in a school superintendents' breakfast.
