Dr. James Garbarino is Co-Director of the Family Life Development Center and the Elizabeth Lee Vincent Professor of Human Development at Cornell University. He will speak on "Parents Under Siege: Why Bad Things Happen to Good Parents and What You Can Do About It."

Dr. Garbarino earned his BA from St. Lawrence University and his Ph. D. in Human Development and Family Studies from Cornell University. He is a Fellow of the

American Psychological Association and has served as consultant or advisor to a wide range of national organizations. He has authored or edited over seventeen books, his latest being "Lost Boys: Why Our Sons Turn Violent and How We can Save Them" (1999).

SCOTT PETERS, Ph.D... "Obsolescence or Renaissance? Living and Writing the Next Chapter of the Cooperative Extension Story"

Scott Peters is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Education at Cornell University. His teaching and extension work at Cornell focus on civic renewal, community education and development, youth

development, and public issues education. His research is devoted to exploring the historical foundations, evolution, and contemporary renewal of cooperative extension's civic mission and public work tradition, and their connection to the democratic promise of the land-grant idea in American higher education. He is currently at work on three books that relate to this theme: a history of the founding and early development of the Cooperative Extension System, a Liberty Hyde Bailey Reader, and a practical

Mr. J.L. CHESTNUT, JR..."Building a Civil Society: Lessons from Selma and the '60's"

In 1958, J. L. Chestnut, Jr., became the first African-American to practice law in Selma, Dallas County, Alabama. In 1963, he helped Bernard Lafayetter (the first civil rights

worker to visit Selma) persuade frightened black Selmians to attend mass meetings. This was the beginning of the "Selma Movement."

When Martin Luther King set up shop in Selma in 1964, Mr. Chestnut represented King in court hearings and handled the cases of hundreds of demonstrators including James Foreman, Dick Gregory, John Lewis, Ralph Abernathy, Joe Lowery and many others. King and Chestnut plotted and planned much of the Selma Civil Rights

War. When the national spotlight left Selma in 1966, Mr. Chestnut remained and "dug in" for the longer and more difficult march, i.e., of turning the possibilities opened up by

Walking Tour of Historic Downtown Albany: Includes stops at two historic churches; St. Mary's Catholic Church famous for elaborate ceiling paintings and St. Peter's Episcopal, completed in 1859 and housing stained glass windows by Tiffany and a set of communion silver given by Queen Anne to her "American Indian" subjects. Visits include Albany City Hall, Corning Memorial Park and the New York State Capitol where construction began in 1865 and lasted 30 years at a cost of \$35 million. The capitol is one of the last great structures to be built entirely of masonry.

Are you where you want to be in your Extension organization? Do you feel like your desires for personal development are shared by the organization? Epsilon Sigma Phi is a vehicle to help you bring alignment between personal development and organizational expectations.

He is one of the principal trial lawyers for the black farmers in their class action lawsuit against the USDA.

The ESP National Board recognizes that we have the opportunity to keep abreast with technological innovation in communications. Some State Chapters are currently utilizing electronic means to communicate with their members, including distribution of newsletters. Within a year's time, we plan to transition from mailing a printed version to electronic posting of the ESP Connection to annual members. This decision is made to save on mailing costs, as well as to keep up with current means of professional communication. Life members and retirees will continue to receive the ESP Connection via mailed print version.

In advance of implementing the shift to an 'electronic only' distribution format for annual members, we will send to all Chapters an electronic message with a link to the ESP website (where the newsletter will be posted), requesting Chapters to forward the message to their electronic membership database. We encourage you to distribute the ESP Connection not only to all ESP members, but also to other Extension employees and administrators. In this interim period, all members will continue to receive a mailed print version.

To ensure effectiveness, we will assess the process with a few Chapters that are already utilizing electronic means to distribute their Chapter newsletter (Louisiana, New York, Utah and Wisconsin). The number of 'hits' to the web site where the newsletter is posted will be recorded to determine member access.

During this transition period, we would appreciate any feedback that Chapters could provide that might be helpful to us in further development of this process. We'll keep you informed of our progress as well as targets to implement this change in 2002.

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PROPOSED CHANGES TO OUR FEDERAL RETIREMENT BENEFITS CONTINUE

Readers may refer to the January 2001 issue of ESP Connection newsletter for previous comments.

Newsletters are also available on the ESP web site < esp-nat.tamu.edulnewsltrs.htm > To keep our members informed, we are providing this update.

There is new consideration within USDA to rescind Schedule A appointments and to 'grand' all current employees on CSRS and FERS Federal retirement programs into their current benefit package. The plan under discussion would also allow transfer of employees among universities. ECOP (Extension Council on Organizational Policy) has reviewed the proposal and supports the approach that is being taken by USDA. At this point it appears that Extension employees' interests have been protected.

- Ask Life Members to serve as officers, chair committees, or serve on committees.
- Offer chapter activities that build relationships between Life Members and soon to retire faculty and staff.
- Initiate short-term chapter projects for which Life Members could take leadership for organizing and implementing. Provide financial assistance to cover expenses for doing so.
- Highlight retiree activities in chapter newsletters.
- Create a chapter directory of all retirees.
- Design an Extension Alumni Tour for Life Members to keep abreast of current programming in the state.
- Ask Life Members to mentor new ESP members in the state chapter.
